## Dear Colleagues,

No quote better summarizes why the mission of our agency is so important to the Western New York community. For each family, a new child is a new beginning, a first step into uncharted territory filled with hope and possibilities as that child's unique personality emerges and takes shape. In our larger community, each child has the potential to make a difference in a lasting and impactful way if he or she is given a strong life foundation. With each child born, our community has the chance to become a better place.

We understand that, for many parents, the incredible joy of having a child can be quickly

matched by despair, worry, and frustration when they must make a critical choice regarding who to trust for child care. Throughout our 27 year history, Child Care Resource Network has remained committed to providing peace of mind for families who use child care by referring them to programs that meet their needs and by working with child care providers to infuse their programs with high quality through researchbased, developmentally appropriate practices. Meeting the needs of families and developing the capacity and skills of child care professionals are essential to developing a strong workforce and community.

While CCRN has advocated for best outcomes for children and families since 1987, 2014 signaled a year of "new beginnings" for our agency, similar to the new beginnings experienced by a family when a new child arrives. Being a newcomer to the agency in 2014, I want to thank the dedicated and talented CCRN team, who has worked to strengthen the infrastructure of our agency to better serve the needs of our community. Over the past year, we have restructured internally and increased community involvement by over 70%; opened 3,882 new child care slots in Erie County; trained more nearly 2,000 child care providers; and directly served more than 4,000 children and families. Together, these figures represent an increase of 15% in CCRN services that benefit the community.

We also expanded upon existing programs that extend beyond the above performance metrics. One example is the Buffalo Microenterprise Refugee Project, through which we collaborate with Journey's End Refugee Services and Jewish Family Services. In 2014, this was the only program of its type in New York State to have refugees successfully open and operate child care businesses that now serve the increasingly complex cultural needs of our region. Other "new beginnings" in 2014 involved new partnerships and initiatives, including:

- from birth through kindergarten entry;
- Support from the Health Foundation for Central and Western New York;
- Higher-education partnerships with Buffalo State College and Niagara University;
- CCRN representation on the Winning Beginning New York statewide advocacy steering committee.

In 2014, Child Care Resource Network experienced many changes that led our agency to the brink of new beginnings, where we are poised to make a greater impact than ever on the children and families of Western New York. We believe that the best is yet to come for our region, but that can only happen if we dedicate ourselves collectively toward ensuring bright new beginnings for each one of our children. Thank you for engaging with our agency in this mission.

# ~ Agency Services ~ **Our Work on Behalf of Children**

### **Child and Adult Care Food Program**

Contracted with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the NYS Department of Health (DOH), the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) issues reimbursement to family, group family and legally exempt child care providers for serving nutritious meals in child care programs. Services include program enrollment, nutrition education, processing claim submissions and regular child care program monitoring.

## **Child Care Registration**

Contracted with the NYS Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) the Child Care Registration program provides registration services for family day care and school age child care programs. Responsibilities include registering and monitoring child care programs, in accordance with the NYS Day Care Regulations, to ensure children are healthy and safe.

## **Education and Training**

The Education and Training program provides an array of services to child care providers with the goal of improving the quality of early care and education for children. Services include:

- Training and Technical Assistance
- Credentialing Programs
- Health Care Consultancy (HCC)
- School Age Child Care Network
- Directors as Leaders (DAL)
- Medication Administration Training (MAT)
- Western New York (WNY) Infant Toddler Resource Network (ITRN)

## Legally Exempt Enrollment

Contracted with the NYS OCFS, the Legally Exempt program provides enrollment and monitoring services to informal child care providers who receive government child care subsidies. To increase the quality of care, the legally exempt program also provides support to child care providers through technical assistance and a health and safety grant program.

## Parent Services

The Parent Services program helps families find child care by providing referrals to licensed and registered child care programs in Erie County that meet the individual needs of families. In addition to assisting families find child care, the Parent Services program provides valuable resources to families on topics related to child development, parent education opportunities and choosing high quality child care.



# We grow child care options...

Child Care Resource Network works to help parents go to work. In 2013-2014, we increased access to child care by opening 32 child care programs. This created 3,882 new child care slots in our community for families in need. These child care programs provide care for all ages of children, from infants to school age, and are inspected regularly to ensure that all children have a safe place to learn and grow when their families are working.

Child Care Resource Network also enrolled over 1,000 legally exempt child care providers. These caregivers help families meet specific child care needs that licensed and registered child care may not. Such needs include overnight and weekend care, flexible child care schedules, cultural and linguistic knowledge and transportation.

Over 1,800 child care inspections completed

# and *sustain* child care businesses.

In 2013-2014, Child Care Resource Network distributed a total of 1.6 million dollars to 422 child care providers through CACFP. These dollars were reimbursement for the out of pocket business expenses child care providers incur to feed children in their programs. Over 3,400 children received healthy meals and snacks while in child care.

Through a coaching and mentoring model, 35 child care providers received support related to child development, curriculum, family relationships, leadership and small business practices. This support ensured that child care providers were equipped with the critical tools necessary to run their businesses with strong programming, giving over 300 children a stable child care program with improved early learning experiences.







In 2013-2014, Child Care Resource Network provided peace of mind for over 800 families in need of child care. We empowered working parents to choose high quality child care by providing information and resources to identify a child care program that was the "right fit" for their family.

Child Care Resource Network empowered child care providers to learn and grow as well. Our professional development training activities included topics related to healthy children, safe environments, responsive care giving, child assessment, and community supports for children and families. This training not only fulfilled NYS regulatory requirements, but supported the lifelong learning needs of child care providers striving to provide quality child care.

Child Care Resource Network is committed to helping child care providers advance their careers with credentials and higher education coursework. In 2013-2014, 35 child care providers participated in a 120 hour nationally recognized Child Development Associate credentialing program. This intensive program requires a year long commitment to learning and was the first step to a college degree for the child care providers who participated!

# We *educate* families and child care providers...

## ~Pley's Story~

Pley came to the United States seven years ago from Myanmar, fleeing political unrest. She loves children and decided to apply for participation in the Child Care Microenterprise Project, funded by Office of Refugee Resettlement. With help from CCRN, Journey's End, and Jewish Family Services, she learned English and took classes to learn how to care for children in developmentally appropriate ways. She also created a business plan to help her achieve her goal: to open a child care program in her home.

Pley opened a home based child care program in the summer of 2014. Now Pley cares for children in her Cheektowaga neighborhood. She loves her child care program and provides high quality early learning experiences for the children in her neighborhood.
